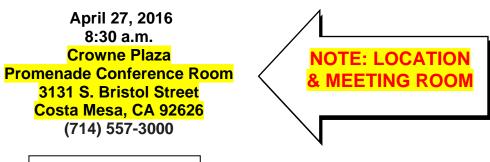

WIOA YOUNG ADULT REQUEST FOR PROPOSALS EVALUATION TEAM REPORT Recommendation Summary April 27, 2016

Approved by the Executive Committee on April 22, 2016.

BACKGROUND:

WIOA legislation mandates that Youth providers be selected through a competitive procurement process. On January 28, 2016, the WIOA Young Adult Career Program Request for Proposals (RFP) was released soliciting proposals that address employment, training needs and skill deficiencies of Out-of-School Young Adults (OSY) ages 17-24 and In-School Young Adults (ISY) ages 17-21 in the County, with the exception of the cities of Santa Ana and Anaheim.

The following policy issues were approved by the Youth Council and Orange County Workforce Investment Board (OCWIB) and incorporated into the January 28, 2016 WIOA Young Adult Career Program RFP release:

SUMMARY OF YOUNG ADULT RFP POLICY ISSUES

- ISSUE #1 REGIONAL AREAS Design the RFP to designate specific regional areas for services to be delivered.
- ISSUE #2 AGES SERVED Design the RFP to serve In-School Young Adults (ISY) ages 17-21 and Out-of-School Young Adults (OSY) ages 17-24, providing referrals to appropriate non-WIA/WIOA resources for 14-16 year old ISY and 16 year old OSY.
- ISSUE #3 FUNDED ACTIVITIES Design the RFP to offer funding for In-School Young Adult Direct Client Activities to be defined as Work Experience (WEX) expenses, On-the-Job Training (OJT), participant supportive services, and participant incentives.

Design the RFP to offer funding for Out-of-School Young Adult services including Operations and Direct Client Activities.

ISSUE #4 WORK EXPERIENCE PROGRAM EXPENDITURE REQUIREMENT

Design the RFP to include a minimum expenditure requirement on the Work Experience Program Component (activities which may include: summer and year-round employment, pre-apprenticeships, on-the-job training, internships, and job shadowing).

ISSUE #5 APPLICATION TERMS

Design the RFP so that proposers may apply for all regions and there is no limit on the amount of regions that may be awarded. Respondents may apply for both ISY and OSY, or either.

On March 8, 2016 twenty-four (24) proposals were received on-time. The RFP Evaluation Team consisting of Industry Experts reviewed the twenty-four (24) proposals that complied with technical specifications. The Evaluation Teams' scores are reflected on the Evaluation Team Ratings Report.

WIOA YOUNG ADULT REQUEST FOR PROPOSALS FUNDING RECOMMENDATIONS Recommendation Summary April 27, 2016

Approved by the Executive Committee on April 22, 2016.

BACKGROUND:

A critical role of young adult program oversight is the selection of service providers. The initial contracts entered into as a result of the recent RFP process will have a start date of July 1, 2016, an end date of June 30, 2017, and may be renewed for up to three (3) additional consecutive one (1) year terms as allowable under WIOA, at the discretion of the oversight committee, full board, and Board of Supervisors, based upon performance and funding availability.

The estimated available funding for Program Year 2016-2017 is \$2,700,000. Out-of-School Young Adults designated funding is \$2,326,800. In-School Young Adults designated funding is \$373,200. Initial In-School funding availability was determined to total \$540,000 and initial Out-of-School funding availability was determined to total \$2,160,000. Taking into consideration the absence of a Southern Region In-School applicant, the \$270,000 initially available for Southern Region In-School has been in portion (\$61,500) allocated to service continuing ISY Southern participants with the remainder (\$208,500) redistributed to ISY Northern and all OSY regions in accordance with the original RFP funding proportion (80% OSY, 20% ISY).

Amounts are subject to change without formal notice to Applicants. Available funding or anticipated funding and service delivery strategies will dictate the recommendations by the full board to the Orange County Board of Supervisors.

RECOMMENDATION(S):

- 1. Approve funding recommendations (as outlined above).
- If WIOA Youth funds allocated by the State and/or the carry-in from Program Year 2015-16 is less than or greater than the estimated amounts, authorize staff to adjust allocations based on percentage increase/decrease. If funding received or carry-in amounts allows additional fundable programs to be funded, authorize staff to make awards to respondent(s) in order of highest evaluation score(s).
- 3. If negotiation does not yield a contract with a top rated recommended respondent(s) in any given region(s), authorize staff to negotiate with the next respondent(s) in order of highest evaluation score(s) within the region(s).
- 4. If an OSY provider prefers not to accept ISY funding for Southern continuing participants, authorize staff to negotiate with another region provider which would best serve the geographic location of the continuing ISY Southern participants.
- 5. If negotiation does not yield a contract for ISY services, authorize staff to concentrate funding on OSY services.
- 6. In the event contract issuance is delayed beyond July 1, 2016, in order to serve those young adults already participating in the WIOA Young Adult Career Program, authorize staff to transitionally fund any current PY 15-16 contractor until the delay is resolved.
- 7. In the event of contract termination at any time during this procurement cycle (July 1, 2016 through June 30, 2020), authorize staff to negotiate with another eligible provider.

ONE-STOP FUNDING RECOMMENDATIONS FOR PY 2016-17 Recommendation Summary April 27, 2016

BACKGROUND:

The WIA Comprehensive/Satellite One-Stop Centers and Business Services Request for Proposal (RFP) was released on December 4, 2012. FY 2016-17 is Year 4 of a five year cycle. Current One-Stop Providers include ProPath, Inc. and Pacific Gateway Workforce Investment Network administered by the City of Long Beach. Other providers procured through either the Workforce Services and/or the Employment and Economic Development Services RFPs may also provide ancillary services to support the One-Stop System.

It is important to note that the funding estimates listed below are only projections and may be more or less based on factors including:

- Unspent funds from FY 2015-16
- Funding agency allocations
- Contractor disallowed costs from prior years
- Provider capacity
- System needs
- Timing of funding allocations from funding agencies
- Prior years' performance of providers

<u>Job Seeker Services:</u> Adult and Dislocated Worker funding is used to fund WIOA services to eligible job seekers in the Orange County Development Area. WIOA funding provides employment and training services to assist eligible individuals in finding and qualifying for meaningful employment and to help employers find the skilled workers they need to compete and succeed in business. Service delivery strategies support workers in activities that align with areas of anticipated economic and job growth. Funding available for FY 2016-17 for Job Seeker Services is anticipated to be approximately \$3,295,000.

Business Services: Rapid Response funding is used to fund required activities provided by Business Services. Rapid Response is a pro-active, business-focused service that responds to layoffs and plant closings by quickly providing assistance to companies and their affected workers. Rapid Response teams work with employers and employee representatives to minimize disruptions associated with job loss. Rapid Response funding is also intended to provide lay-off aversion services for businesses. Some Adult and Dislocated Worker funds may also be used to supplement Business Service activities. Rapid Response funding available for FY 2016-17 for Business Services is anticipated to be approximately \$350,000.

<u>The Senior Community Service Employment Program (SCSEP)</u> is funded through the California Department on Aging. The SCSEP provides job training and work experience for low income adults 55 and older in Orange County. **The amount of** anticipated funding for FY 2016-17 is approximately \$100,000 for program operations and \$590,000 for participant wages.

<u>Vocational Training (VTR) and Work Experience (WEX)</u> program provides job training and work experience activities to enhance and facilitate opportunities for CalWORKS Welfare-to-Work (WtW) customers to find and retain stable employment to become selfsufficient. The clients served in this referral based program frequently have multiple barriers which must be addressed if they are to have successful outcomes. The program provides both vocational training and work experience options. **FY 2016-17 funding** from the County of Orange Social Services Agency (SSA) is estimated to be approximately \$480,000.

Employment Preparation Program (EPP)

The Employment Preparation Program provides Welfare-to-Work participants who may have little or no work history an opportunity to learn soft skills, build workplace confidence and self-esteem through paid employment training in a specific field of choice in the public, private non-profit, or private employment sector. Participants will learn skills through a variety of workshops, one-on-one training, coaching and paid employment training. Upon completion of the program participants will gain employment skills, enhance experience and develop a positive work ethic that will increase their chances to find unsubsidized employment. **FY 2016-17 funding from the County of Orange Social Services Agency (SSA) is estimated to be approximately \$1,800,000.**

OC4VETS

The Orange County Health Care Agency (HCA) received multi-year funding to provide wrap around services to veterans. Funded through Proposition 63, the Mental Health Services Act (MHSA), this innovative project uses multiple strategies to outreach, engage, and ensure veterans' access to needed resources as well as improve collaboration among agencies providing services to veterans. In addition to behavioral health services, veterans who participate in the program work with an employment specialist and a housing specialist and receive a full array of supportive services. **Funding for FY 2016-17 is anticipated to be approximately \$460,540**.

The above funding recommendations are based on best estimates at this point in time. All WIOA Agreements will contain a thirty (30) day termination clause which may be implemented when there are deficiencies in the Contractor's ability to deliver services as outlined in the Statement of Work.

As other funding streams become available, the OCWIB reserves the right to continue to fund the One-Stop System utilizing current providers. However, the OCWIB may incorporate other entities which have submitted a 'fundable' proposal under this RFP, the Workforce Services RFP or the Employment and Economic Development RFP; competitively procure other providers; or fund additional activities that are in the best interest of the OCWIB.

Contracts will be for one year, beginning July 1, 2016 and ending June 30, 2017. All funding recommendations for Program Year 2016-17 are anticipated to be presented to the Orange County Board of Supervisors for approval on or about May 24, 2016.

RECOMMENDATION(S):

- Comprehensive One-Stop Centers and Business Services Funding Allocations may be allocated as noted below. All amounts are an "up to" amount and agreements may be executed at lesser amounts, or not executed at all contingent upon the above stated factors. Conversely, contracts may be executed at higher amounts as funding requirements change as directed by funding agencies. Said amounts will be commensurate to and will not exceed those issued to the County from said funders.
 - a. Fund <u>ProPath, Inc</u>. \$6,441,294 for Adult, Dislocated Worker, Rapid Response, SCSEP, OC4VETS and Welfare-to-Work programs.

- b. Fund Orange County Asian Pacific Islander Community Alliance (OCAPICA) \$588,282 for SSA Welfare to Work Programs - Work Experience, Vocational Training and EPP Services.
- 2. Direct staff to determine final FY 2016-17 funding allocations within the parameters outlined in Recommendation #1a-b above as well as divide between North, South, and Satellite locations. Funding allocations for final contract(s) will be based upon the following factors:
 - (a) Unspent funds from FY 2015-16
 - (b) Funding agency allocations
 - (c) Contractor disallowed costs from prior years
 - (d) Provider capacity
 - (e) System needs
 - (f) Timing of funding allocations from funding agencies
 - (g) Prior years' performance of providers
- 3. Without further OCWIB approval, staff may shift funds between funding streams to maximize service provision.
- 4. If WIOA funds allocated by the State and/or the carry-in from FY 2015-16 is less than or greater than the estimated amounts, authorize staff to adjust allocations based on percentage increases or decreases.
- 5. Without further OCWIB approval, authorize staff to exercise a cost contingency increase not to exceed a total of ten (10) percent of the contract amounts.
- 6. If negotiations do not yield a contract with a current Provider, authorize staff to negotiate with other fundable providers as procured through the WIA Comprehensive/Satellite One-Stop Centers and Business Services RFP, the Workforce Services RFP and/or the Employment and Economic Development RFP.

WORKFORCE SERVICES FUNDING RECOMMENDATIONS FOR PY 2016-17 Recommendation Summary April 27, 2016

BACKGROUND:

On December 20, 2012, the Orange County Workforce Investment Board released a Request for Proposals (RFP) for Workforce Services to establish a list of eligible individuals, organizations and municipalities to provide a full range of services related to the Workforce Investment Act programs offered in Orange County. The RFP was advertised on the County's online bidding system. The RFP specified:

- 1. Respondents had the option to submit a proposal for one specific type of Workforce Service or all Workforce Services.
- 2. A four (4) year cycle that includes three renewal years. Program Year 2016-17 represents year four (4) of the cycle.
- Services will be "project specific" and contracts will be negotiated on an asneeded basis as required for particular project assignment(s), including special grants that are awarded. In some cases, short notice will be required to complete projects, and contractor ability and capacity may determine award and/or project assignment.

On April 24, 2013 and April 23, 2014 staff presented the list of approved vendors to the OCWIB. The Board approved the Workforce Services RFP Vendor List, and directed Staff to determine and assign projects and associated funds to providers based upon the following factors: a) system needs; b) vendor capacity and demonstrated expertise c) effective utilization of funding; and d) funding availability.

Approval of Workforce Services Agreements for a total amount of up to \$5,000,000 annually will allow various Professional and Training Workforce Services related to workforce and economic development activities to continue to be implemented from July 1, 2013 through June 30, 2017. However, contracts resulting from this RFP are only executed as federal and State or other discretionary funding is made available to the County/OCWIB.

RECOMMENDATION(S):

1. Direct Staff to determine and assign projects and associated funds to various approved Workforce Services providers based upon the following factors: a) system needs; b) vendor capacity and demonstrated expertise; and c) funding availability.

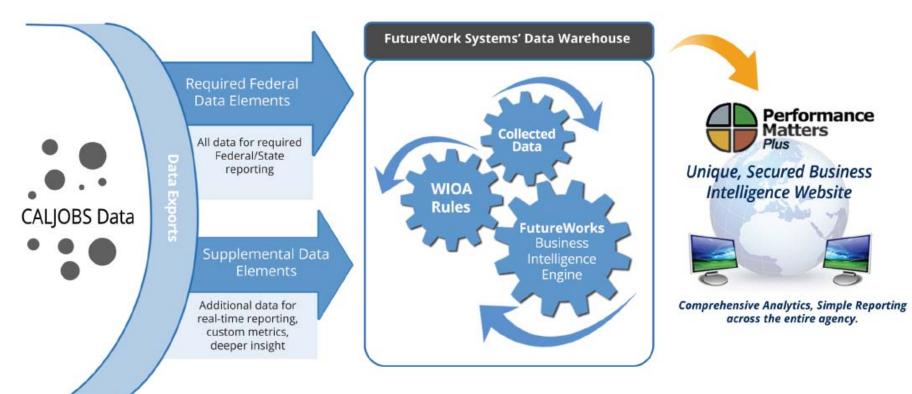
